GRATEFUL FOR THE CHANCE TO LIVE AGAIN

In late 2020, I sat in my doctor's office and watched her face as she reviewed the results of my recent blood test. My liver enzymes were very high and I was sent to a specialist for further testing. I took a fibroscan, an ultrasound of your internal organs, and saw the technician make pained faces as she viewed the images of the interior of my liver. I knew it was bad news.

"The fibroscan was conclusive, you have fatty liver with borderline cirrhosis. Unless you make drastic lifestyle changes immediately, your liver will be permanently damaged. You would most likely need a liver transplant within the next decade," the doctor finally said.

For a moment, I sat in stunned silence processing my situation. It was the worst nightmare of all problem drinkers like me: when the past finally catches up. The abuse I inflicted on my body through my alcoholism was finally coming home to roost.

"I recommend that you stop drinking alcohol in all forms immediately and remain alcohol free," she finished.

The Big Book talks about a "jumping off point" and this conversation with my doctor was it. I realized I could not continue drinking and using without seriously risking my health.

At the same time, I was completely unwilling and unprepared to try and live without alcohol and drugs. It was the worst feeling of my entire life.

If drinking and partying was once an effective medicine for my problems, it was no longer working. The consequences were now serious. I broke with girlfriends, damaged relationships with my friends and family, got fired from multiple jobs, and had many visits to jail. I was trapped in a never ending cycle, and it was getting harder to carry on. I felt as if I had been treading water for years and I was running out of energy to keep swimming.

At the time, I felt crushed by feelings of pressure and hopelessness. I now see that experience as a blessing instead of a vicious defeat. From the ashes of that bottom, I gained a beautiful "gift of desperation" that I used to transform my life with the help of the fellowship and principles of Alcoholics Anonymous. I was finally beaten down enough to admit defeat; I was powerless over alcohol and nothing I could do by myself would work to relieve it. I needed to try a different way.

I decided to go all in on the AA method and planned to attend 90 meetings in 90 days. Most of the meetings I attended were held virtually on Zoom. Within a month, I found an incredible home group and a sponsor I trusted to guide me through the 12 Steps.

I began calling every day and reaching out to other alcoholics. I discovered that when I took my mind off myself and tried to be of service to the other people around me, the negativity and anxiety which ruled my previous life was lifted. I began to seek a form of spirituality that works for me. I turned my focus to keeping my side of the street clean and surrendering my will to my higher power.

It seemed any action I took related to recovery opened new relationships and service opportunities. By keeping an open mind and attempting to be teachable, I was exposed to a different way of thinking and saw the AA program as a successful blueprint for living.

By working the steps of this program and applying its principles to my daily life whenever possible, I experienced a miracle. I am no longer a slave to the constant obsession of getting intoxicated. When I am physically, emotionally, and spiritually sober, my life looks much different than it used to. I am free, and I am grateful for the chance to live again.

The purpose of the Central Office is to provide the basic services listed, to include, but not limited to:

- 1. To carry the A.A. message and help those individuals who suffer from alcoholism.
- 2. To maintain a 24-hour Twelve-Step phone service, and to answer phone inquiries as needed.
- 3. To provide an A.A. listing in appropriate public sources.
- 4. To function as a clearing house for the circulation and exchange of information among all of the A.A. Groups in the area.
- 5. To compile, update and print meeting lists and other information about local A.A. services.
- 6. To maintain A.A. Conference approved literature and Grapevine literature for sale to members and the public.
- 7. To print and distribute a newsletter.
- 8. To be available to those in the community seeking information about alcoholism and A.A.
- 9. To maintain contact, refer inquiries and cooperate with General Service Committees and local groups.
- 10. To arrange, delegate, or manage the details of all Central Office events or any other functions approved by the CO Committee.
- 11. Specifically excluded shall be the operation of any club, clubhouse or drying-out place, and acts in violation of the Twelve Traditions and promotion thereof.
- 12. Provide a limited number of Anniversary coins.
- 13. Such other activities that are consistent with the principles of the Twelve Traditions.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Humility for Today

There can be no absolute humility for us humans. At best, we can only glimpse the meaning and splendor of such a perfect ideal. As the book Alcoholics Anonymous says: "We are not saints ... we claim spiritual progress rather than spiritual perfection." Only God himself can manifest in the absolute; we human beings need live and grow in the domain of the relative. We seek humility for today.

Therefore our practical question is this: "Just what do we mean by 'humility for today' and how do we know when we have found it?"

We scarcely need be reminded that excessive guilt or rebellion leads to spiritual poverty. But it was a very long time before we knew we could go even more broke on spiritual pride. When we early AAs got our first glimmer of how spiritually prideful we could be, we coined this expression: "Don't try to get too damned good by Thursday!" That old-time admonition may look like another of those handy alibis that can excuse us from trying for our best. Yet a closer view reveals just the contrary. This is our AA way of warning against pride-blindness, and the imaginary perfections that we do not possess.

Now that we no longer patronize bars and bordellos; now that we bring home the paychecks; now that we are so very active in AA; and now that people congratulate us on these signs of progress — well, we naturally proceed to congratulate ourselves. Yet we may not be within hailing distance of humility. Meaning well, yet doing badly, how often have I said or thought, "I am right and you are wrong," "My plan is correct and yours is faulty," "Thank God your sins are not my sins," "You are hurting AA and I'm going to stop you cold," "I have God's guidance, so he is on my side." And so on, indefinitely.

The alarming thing about such pride-blindness is the ease with which it is justified. But we need not look far to see that this deceptive brand of self-justification is a universal destroyer of harmony and of love. It sets person against person, nation against nation. By it, every form of folly and violence can be made to look right, and even respectable. Of course it is not for us to condemn. We need only investigate ourselves.

About Bill W.

Bill W. was born in East Dorset, Vermont, on November 26, 1895. With Dr. Bob S. of Akron, Ohio, he co-founded Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. Hospitalized for alcoholism, he experienced a profound spiritual transformation that changed his life and inspired many of the principles of the AA movement. Bill W., a nondrinking alcoholic stockbroker from New York convinced a hungover alcoholic surgeon in Akron, Ohio, that he didn't have to drink anymore.

From that historic meeting in Akron, a program of recovery for more than two million once hopeless alcoholics in more than 150 countries was to grow and flourish.

Bill W recognized that the recurring desire to drink disappears when one alcoholic works with another. This understanding became a basic principle of the new society. In addition, Bill promoted the idea that alcoholism is an illness, which can be arrested but not cured. Influenced by this AA concept, the American Medical Association later redefined alcoholism as a disease, not a failure of will.

AAs basic text, Alcoholics Anonymous, was written largely by Bill W. in association with other early AAs. Since its first publication in 1939, the Big Book, as it's called, has sold more than twenty-two million copies and has been translated into more than forty languages. The revolutionary Twelve-Step program of recovery it contains is the model for many other programs of recovery.

In the Twelve Traditions, first developed and presented in the pages of the Grapevine, Bill created a lasting blueprint for AA unity, incorporating the unique principles of anonymity, self-support, membership, and non affiliation.

In addition to his many writings, Bill devoted himself to developing an enduring service structure for Alcoholics Anonymous.

In June 1999, Time magazine named Bill W as one of the hundred most influential people of the twentieth century. Bill passed away on January 24, 1971.

Central Office Meeting Minutes - July 2024 "Serving Our Community for Over 75 years"

Treasurer: Chris G. – June P&L just came through and Net Income was \$-630 for the month of June, so we operated at a loss. Bookkeeper added in the purple can expenses. Purple Can YTD Net Income was \$4,609.47.

Donations this month were \$1,110.39, a roughly 28% decrease from 2023. This drop only amounts to about \$400 since June, it appears to be a very slow month for contributions. Overall, we are up about 10% in group donations year-over-year.

501(c) accreditation is being renewed through Wade's accountant contact.

CENTRAL OFFICE MEETING MINUTES - JULY 2024

STANDING COMMITTEE CHAIRS

Bylaws: Brad C. – Two proposed Amendments.

Amendment #1 concerning 6.8.1 re: Board of Trustees and eligibility for election. Currently requires a CO Committee. Proposed change is to remove the requirement for "one year of CO committee membership."

Discussion: Charlie mentioned that the purpose of the requirement is to ensure the candidate has experience. Phillip noted that the position was previously open for a year, but they had waived the requirement.

Vote taken: 21 for accepting the amendment, 8 opposed. Motion PASSED. No minority opinion volunteered.

Amendment #2 concerning 6.7.5 re: Immediate Past Chairperson which states: "The Chairperson who has completed his or her term shall automatically assume the duties of Immediate Past Chairperson for a period of two years. Proposed change is to remove this two year post commitment requirement."

Wade brought up that the candidate might not want to serve for a total of 4 years. Immediate past chair is a voting member for 2 years afterwards. 32 for, none against. Motion unanimously PASSED.

Treatment Facilities and Accessibilities: Charlie T – We've reached the half year mark and Purple Can donations total \$1,966.20.

New Business

We (the Board of Trustees and Committee Members) approved three online registrations for Elan and two others to attend the National AA Technology Workshop (NAATW), happening this year from September 13th -15th at \$100/person. The hybrid option is only available if 57 more people (130 total) register for online attendance; otherwise, all online registration fees will be fully refunded.

We (the Board of Trustees and Committee Members) also discussed creating a new position titled "Alternate Technology Chair" to aid the current Tech Chair with the rapidly increasing responsibilities associated with our growing dependence on technology.

Please take back to your groups for input. Discussion: Fred asked for a guideline on the position and Brad confirmed that it would be the same as that of the current position. Questions: Why not just establish an unofficial co-chair, under Elan? Wade explained that the position of alternate has more gravity. The position would have to be put into By-Laws. Mark from Bog Irish asked if the position would require technical skills? It would help but not necessary. What do the duties entail? Managing Zoom here and in Salt Lake Valley; any other IT issues such as managing Central Office computers, payment systems. Lisa asked if the term would be the same 2 years or 1 and if it was possible to structure the committee to just include members. Brad confirmed this is the current way things are run. Brian from Southenders wanted to confirm that we wouldn't be buying more equipment. Declan wants a list of tech responsibilities listed. Elan, Brad, others will create the language and submit for a vote next month.

Other items of business: Wade followed up on the other 2 people that would attend the online Tech conference. We had discussed sending Jeff and Shannon at the Board meeting. Fred from Fresh Air brought up the idea of opening up announcements to all events, not just local AA events.

Adjourn and close the responsibility statement.

What is the purpose of anonymity in Alcoholics Anonymous? Why is it often referred to as the greatest single protection the Fellowship has to assure its continued existence and growth?

If we look at the history of A.A., from its beginning in 1935 until now, it is clear that anonymity serves two different yet equally vital functions:

- At the personal level, anonymity provides protection for all members from identification as alcoholics, a safeguard often of special importance to newcomers.
- At the public level of press, radio, TV, film/ video other public forms of the Internet and social media platforms, anonymity stresses the equality in the Fellowship of all members by putting the brake on those who might otherwise exploit their A.A. affiliation to achieve recognition, power, or personal gain.

The word "anonymous" in our name is meant to provide as much privacy as an individual may desire regarding membership in A.A.


